## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Earl A. Alluisi

First, let me give a special note of thanks to all those who wrote and copied me on their letters to Dr. Herbert L. Pick, Jr., in response to the request made in the Spring 1975 issue of this NEWSLETTER. I received copies of letters sent by Arthur J. Drucker, Leland D. Brokaw, Paul D. Nelson, John E. Taylor, Wayne S. Sellman, L. Ralph Chason, A. David Mangelsdorff, William H. Hendrix, and Glenn R. Hawkes.

Secondly, let me express my appreciation (and, I am confident, that of our entire divisional membership) to the members and chairman of the divisional Program Committee, L. Ralph Chason (Chairman), James K. Arima, Donald F. Haggard, Dirk C. Prather, and Charles A. Thomas, Jr. They have devoted a great deal of time and effort, especially during the last quarter, to the development of a final program for the APA meetings in Chicago this year. The program consists of three pre-convention workshops, three paper sessions, six symposia, one invited address, one conversation hour, three business meetings (including meetings of the divisional executive committee), and a social hour (co-sponsored with Division 21). The program appears to me to be both well-balanced and of high quality. [Editor's Note: The program is listed beginning on page 7.]

Finally, let me observe that as I write this "Message", it is that time of year during the development of the Defense budget when military psychology's Washington representatives are especially busy in providing information to, and responding to inquiries from, the several Congressional committees who review the Defense budget request. Excellent liaison and good working relations with the committee staffs have been developed; military psychology is being well represented, and its programs well presented in Washington. Yet, how much easier the job would be, were our representatives to have immediately available hard evidence of the worth of military psychology in the cost-effectiveness terms of management language!

Some facts are available and recognized. For example, Defense personnel costs, including the pay and allowances of retired Military personnel, account for about 55% of the total Defense budget. Over 2/3 of the total life-cycle costs of major weapon systems are estimated to be manpower related costs. Military individual training alone accounts for costs of about \$6.5 billion annually, with about 1/6 of all Military personnel being directly involved in individual training (either as trainees, trainers, or support personnel) at any given moment in time.

In spite of these facts, their recognition in high places, and the increases over the past several years in the total Research, Development, Test and Evaluation (RDT&E) funds allocated for direct human-resources research and development, the current level of support is still best characterized as quite "modest". It is certainly so in relation to any of the proportions given in the preceding paragraph. And even this modest amount must be "justified" to extents all out of proportion to its dollar value and the customary justifications required in other areas. The situation is not very sensible. It ought to be changed. I believe it is within our power to change it.

How? This brings me back to the final paragraph of the previous "Message": we must present evidence of military psychology's usefulness in the language of the managers who must reach decisions regarding the allocation of resources to different endeavors. I am confident that military psychology will grow to the extent that the evidence of its worth is sufficient and compelling--and academic rhetoric is neither, whereas valid cost-benefits analyses can be both.

Funding at the 6.1-research level depends on the same sort of justification, albeit indirectly rather than directly so. This very foundation of the technological base is dependent on evidence of past "successes" for its credibility. The yield from the human-resources part of the technology-base information pool during past and present crises is probably the best justification for enlargement of the pool to provide a higher likelihood of even greater yield during the next and future (as yet unknown) crises. Little enthusiasm, less justification, and essentially no support could be generated for an inapplicable pool of "information".

So, if we want 6.1-research level funding in human resources to be increased during future years, let us hope that those who can contribute to the easing of current crises do so. Let us also hope that they document their contributions in management's language--in cost-effectiveness terms. For example, let us hope that those who are applying training technology and the use of simulators in training in response to the needs of current fuel crises document their contributions in cost-effectiveness terms--how training effectiveness was influenced, how costs were influenced, and the functional relation between the two. Let us hope that the engineering psychologists document the life-cycle cost-benefits of the weapon-system design recommendations. Let us hope that military psychology's managers begin routinely to provide cost-benefit analyses and documentation.

Such documentation, and only such documentation, may help to bring the funding for military psychology (research, development, applications, and services) into closer alignment with the personnel or manpower-related costs of the Defense System.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

The balance on hand 20 May 1975 was \$1,549.07, a figure which includes most of our expected annual income for the year from dues allotments, our main source of income.

Both expenditures and income are occurring at rates slightly lower than projected in September 1974. Thus we are still hopeful that expenditures will not exceed income for 1974-75.

The Military Psychology Awards Fund balance is approximately \$900, allowing for interest earnings since December 1974.

## STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

### ELECTION COMMITTEE

The voting for Division 19 officers will be by ballot which Division members should be receiving in June. A recent phone call to APA Headquarters by Art Drucker (who, as President-Elect, serves as Chairman of the Election Committee) indicated that between 35-40% of those eligible actually voted for the APA President, while slightly less than that figure vote in specific division elections.

In Division 19 last year, out of 416 members eligible to vote, 157 voted for the President-Elect (38%). While this figure compares favorably with the APA average, the committee urges everyone to vote in the up-coming election. This is your opportunity to state your preferences and have a voice in Division affairs; so let's try to better our participation by filling out and returning the election ballot that will be mailed out by APA this month.

### FELLOW COMMITTEE

The Fellow Committee, chaired by Earl I. Jones, has completed its review of all applications for status as Fellows. The final recommendations worked out by the Fellows Committee will be forwarded to the Membership Committee of APA during the month of June.

## MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The Membership Committee received 62 interest slips during the year. From this number, 28 completed application forms for membership in Division 19 had been returned by the end of May.

## MILITARY PSYCHOLOGY AWARDS FUND

The first recipient of the award for an outstanding contribution to the field of Military Psychology will be announced at the forthcoming meetings of the APA. Eight nominations were received by the Awards Committee. The nominations included work in psychotherapeutic techniques, basic research in vision, training methods, and decision-making systems.

The criterion used for judging was excellence of product. The committee standards define product to include research, program development and application, or services performed.

## THREE WORKSHOPS TO BE HELD AT ANNUAL MEETINGS

Earl Alluisi has accepted, on behalf of Division 19, an invitation from Division 21 to co-sponsor workshops being planned as APA pre-convention meetings in Chicago at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on Friday, 29 August 1975. Division 19 will lend support for each of three workshops which will run concurrently from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

IN MEMORIAM  
EUGENE A. COGAN

Eugene A. Cogan, 46, a long-time member of Division 19, died after apparently suffering a heart attack, in Alexandria, Virginia, on April 28, 1975.

At the time of his death, he was director for research design and reporting at the Human Resources Research Organization in Alexandria.

Dr. Cogan was a Fellow of the American Psychological Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He was a member of the Washington Operations Research Council, the Army Mathematics Steering Committee and several professional fraternities.

Born in New York City, Dr. Cogan attended the University of California at Los Angeles, where he received a bachelor's degree in 1947, a master's degree in 1949 and a doctor's degree in 1951, all in psychology.

Dr. Cogan first joined HumRRO, then located in Washington, as a research scientist in 1951. During 1953-55, he was a social science research technician in the Army, serving at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research.

He then rejoined HumRRO as a research scientist and statistical supervisor in Fort Knox, Kentucky, for a year.

From 1956 to 1959, Dr. Cogan was director of a group research project and a research associate at the Harvard Medical School.

He returned to HumRRO as an adviser on psychostatistical methods, and in 1964 was appointed to the position he held at the time of his death.
