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NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Since most of you were not at the Division 19 meeting at the APA Convention in Washington, DC last August, I will repeat a few key elements of what I said then, and add a few thoughts based on more recent events.

First let me pay tribute to my predecessor, Jim Arima. He succumbed to his cancer on July 16, 1982, but he fought to the end and was very active in his Division 19 presidency. We and the APA have sent sympathy notes to Jim's widow, but the best way to show our gratitude and respect for his achievements is to continue the work he set in motion

Second, let me express my gratitude to all those who have agreed to play a more active role in the organizational work of the Division. Because of Paul Nelson's resignation as our Council Representative (required because he has become an APA employee) Randy Chambers has agreed to be our new representative to council until a permanent representative is nominated and elected next Summer. In addition, since Dave Mangelsdorff is now President-Elect, Joe Fishburne has agreed to serve as Secretary-Treasurer starting January 1, 1982. This office also will be voted on in the Summer 1983 elections. Since we have no past president we have asked Bert King to serve on the Awards Committee. To all who serve, we owe a debt of gratitude.

Third, I should announce a change in my own status. On December 1, 1982, I retired from the Army and thus ended my 30 years of active service and my duties as Psychology Consultant to the Army Surgeon General. I no longer wear the uniform, but I remain strongly concerned with all aspects of military psychology, so I will keep in close touch with military issues. I can no longer be reached at Autovon 225-5690, but my successor as Psychology Consultant, LTC(P) Joe Fishburne, can relay messages to me if they are left at that number. A quicker method is to call or write me at my home: 7124 Roslyn Ave., Rockville, MD 20855, Phone 301-926-2952. Do not hesitate to call outside of duty hours if that cuts the cost of your call. I will do the same since I no longer have convenient access to autovon.

Let me shift from administrative details to broader goals. As I see it, there are four main functions of Division 19:

(1) We want to help military psychologists get to know and support each other. We do that by the organizational work we do within the Division. We need active support from all of you in this work. We need to call on many of you to serve on our standing and ad hoc committess as well as to serve on special projects. If you want to be more involved, let me know.

(2) We want an active program of papers, symposia and lectures at the annual convention. This depends on your individual submissions and the work of the program committee. We hope we will continue to have a good number of top quality submissions. In this connection, you are reminded that submitting a paper commits you to attend and present the paper if it is selected. Several presenters committed the great discourtesy at the 1982 APA Convention of neither appearing nor scheduling a substitute. That is an injury to the prospective audience. It also means that other speakers who would have presented papers were needlessly rejected.

(3) I am eager to have the Division members learn more about APA activities which have special significance for our Division. I am asking all committee chairmen and our council representative, Randy Chambers, to prepare brief reports for the newsletter on issues that concern us but do not appear in the APA Monitor.

(4) I am equally desirous that our members should have their views and concerns presented to the Council of Representatives and other APA governing and organizational bodies. If you want something fed into the APA, contact me and I will see that it is passed on to the APA by the most appropriate channel. During a recent visit to the APA I was asked to list things APA could do for military psychology and military psychologists. That is a welcome sign of concern and support from the APA. I responded with some ideas of my own, but I hope that you will contact me with more ideas that you feel need to be presented.

It is my earnest hope to accomplish all four of the goals listed above, and I welcome any suggestions you have. I appreciate the honor you have paid me in electing me as your President. I think I am the first clinical psychologist and only the second uniformed psychologist to be selected as your President. Naturally I intend to represent the concerns of clinicians and of uniformed psychologists, but my interests are much broader than that. I want to fully and fairly represent and serve the interests of all the members of our Division, which has become so diverse in its membership and areas of specialization that it is row a microcosm of the entire APA. With your support I shall achieve that goal. I look forward to an active and fruitful year for us all.

RESULTS OF THE SUMMER 1982 SURVEY OF DIVISION 19 MEMBERS

A total of 64 responses from the 590 Division 19 members and associates were returned. Of the 64 responses, 10.8% of the total membership, 7.8% were from Associates, 66.7% from members, and 23.4% from Fellows. ICSU coordinates many interdisciplinary and international activities of national science academies and international scientific unions. IUPsyS coordinates the international activities of 44 national psychological associations. All American psychologists can now have access to ICSU through the American Psychological Association since it is the only American member of IUPsyS.

He represented Division 19 at these meetings, which were attended by the voting representatives of all of the APA Divisions, the Coalitions and States, and the elected APA officers, the APA Board of Directors, the APA Boards and Committees, and many staff personnel from the APA Central Office. The scheduled and supplemental Council Agenda for January 20-23 included over 92 Action and Information Items for the full Council meetings (January 21-23), and a variety of Forums meetings, Caucus sessions for Boards and Committees, meetings of the Coalitions and Caucuses of Council, and workshops, reports, and other information on Council and Governance structure, Task Forces, Committees, and Boards regarding work and activities in preparing the Council Agenda Items.
