PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

By now I hope that most of you have been contacted by someone from the Network. My intentions were that as many people as possible would have opportunities to communicate with some neighbors who were members of Division 19. Among the feedback, I have heard some folks talked to friends whom they had lost track of, others got the opportunity to make new friends, some wondered why I had suggested discussing the APA Council apportionment (after the balloting had occurred), others had issues for consideration by Division 19. I believe it presented an opportunity to let you know my concern to be responsive to the membership in as personal a manner as I could arrange: I also believe it allowed for increased discussion of issues and dissemination of information.

I am happy to report we retained our single representative on Council, though not by much (0.71%). As I suggested in my last message, it will take considerable effort to raise our number of representatives to two (a proportion of the total APA votes of at least 1.51% which translates to roughly 90% of our 650 members assigning at least 6 of their 10 votes to Division 19). I believe the solution would be to target particular years to ask for committments to Division 19 to get the second representative, then suggest members with additional loyalties redistribute their votes in alternate years (the majority of our members are also members of Divisions 1, 5, 12, 14, 21, or 38). This would allow for maximum support of Division 19, while minimizing the disruption of other division (12 has 6 reps, 38 has 2 reps). How about targeting this coming year (Fall, 1984) to maximally support Division 19?

I have been trying to keep informed by teleconferencing with Bill Maynard and selected members of the Psychologists in Uniform group. The discussions have centered on credentialing, entry and practice requirements for active duty psychologists, andCongressional inquiries concerning psychologists. Joe Fishburne will represent uniformed psychologists' concerns to a Department of Defense investigating committee. If necessary to assist the uniformed psychologists in this effort, I may put together a brief survey before June. What this means to the uniformed folks is I may need your help in responding to a survey of active duty psychologist's concerns. I believe a Division 19 study would be perceived by the congressional committees as less biased than would a report from the armed services.

Dick Bloom has been keeping me informed on hisliason with the Committee on International Relations. To the question of what areas of foreign strengths in psychological science versus United States relative weaknesses, the following areas were recognized: sports psychology, human factors, occupational assessment, neuropsychology, cognitive psychology, parapsychology, military applications of attitudes and social cognition. If anyone would like further information, or would like to discuss these ideas, please contact Dick Bloom at Ft. Detrick, MD, (301-663-7603).

Also, elsewhere in this Newsletter, you will find another revision of the Network, now divided into 13 groups. I have tried to take into

AD HOC COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS NEWS

- The National Science Board, governing body of the National Science ence Foundation, has formed a Committee on International Science, charged with evaluating the scientific capability of the United States in a world-wide context. The Committee has asked APA President Janet Spence to suggest areas of excellence in psychological science outside the United States, especially where these are paired with pockets of relative weakness within the United States.

President Spence has asked the APA's Committee on International Relations and APA Division Liason to the Committee to assist her in responding to the tasking of the Committee on International Science. While not intending to represent the official view of the APA, the President may, nevertheless have some influence on the thinking of the National Science Board.

The Division 19 Ad Hoc Committee on International Relations has acted by contacting a sample of colleagues through the Division 19 Network. All responses were noted, analyzed and integrated into an executive summary format. The summary was sent of Steve Kennedy at the APA International Affairs Office. The Ad Hoc Committee thanks all Division 19 members who contributed their tiem and expertise.

- The APA Division of Community Psychology (Division 27) is setting up an international network to facilitate communication of theory, data, applications and professional activities. Regional coordinators include representatives from New Zealand, Canada, Puerto Rico, Turkey and Israel. Division 19 members interested in international developments in Community Psychology can contact the Ad Hoc Committee for the names, addresses and telephone numbers of Division 27 coordinators.
- The New York Times of December 14, 1983 contained a short analysis of how assassins are psychologically prepared for action. The Ad Hoc Committee has copies of the article which was focused on the October 23, 1983 attack on the U.S. Marine Corps Compound at Beirut, Lebanon.
- The International Council of Psychologists, Inc., a non-profit educational organization has information that two psychologists, My-khaylo Horun, of the USSR, and Edward Akong'o Oyugi, of Kenya, have been adopted by Amnesty International as Prisoners of Conscience. The Ad Hoc Committee has information on their alleged crimes and sentences. A network is being formed for those who wish to write letters on behalf of psychologists whose human rights are in jeopardy.
